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## Buffalo Gnat Alert! It's that time of year again . . .

“Black flies are tiny, blood-sucking flies often called buffalo gnats or turkey gnats. Contrary to their name, black flies may be gray, tan, or even greenish. They usually breed in fast moving water of streams and rivers. They are tremendous pests of humans, domestic animals, and wildlife every spring in northern areas of the United States and Canada. They may be encountered from March to June.

“Buffalo gnats can kill chickens and livestock by nuisance effects alone. Chickens have been reported to die of suffocation after buffalo gnats clogged the birds' respiratory tracts. Wild birds and poultry have died from a toxic shock-like syndrome caused by the saliva from black fly feeding. Buffalo gnats may transmit various diseases, including leucocytozoonosis, a disease of turkeys, geese, ducks, and sometimes chickens.

“Fortunately, buffalo gnats are daytime biters and rarely venture indoors. So one thing you can do is go inside if the gnats are biting. Providing shelters for poultry may help, since the flies don't like enclosures.

“Although not specifically labeled for black flies, there are on-animal products labeled for mosquito and biting fly control that you can apply directly to chickens. Many of these prod-

ucts contain the active ingredient permethrin and may also be used directly on poultry.

Buffalo gnats generally only live 4 to 5 weeks and should go away in hot summer. 85 de-

grees and above kills them.

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About ALFA: Any APA recognized Class, Breed and/or Variety shall be eligible to compete for ALFA Awards. American Game Large Fowl are eligible for ALFA competition and awards. Any Breed or Variety which has submitted a "standard" to the APA and is requesting inclusion into the APA Standard shall be eligible for ALFA awards.

ALFA competition begins with the birds which are entered in the regular show. Placings from the base show will be

used in picking the top finalists for ALFA Awards.

Final numbers and amounts of ALFA awards at each show will be determined by the membership numbers 30 days before the show or by the entry deadline date for the district show. Any ALFA member, regardless of which District they live in are eligible to show and win awards in any ALFA show. No one will be allowed to compete in any ALFA event if their membership isn't paid by entry deadline date of the show in question. Membership can be obtained at any time during the year. ALFA membership is good from Jan. 1st through Dec. 31st each year.

It is estimated that 30% of all

ALFA membership fee's will be awarded at the ALFA Nationals each November. Amounts of premiums will be based entirely on the number of ALFA memberships sold during the year less any special events ALFA may sponsor. District Shows will be awarding 50% of their District's membership fees for their own District Show. Of the remaining 50% of card fees, 30% will go to the ALFA National Jackpot Fund and the remaining 20% will be used for administrative costs for trophies, awards, PayPal, etc.

ALFA© is the acronym for "American Large Fowl Association." ALFA© is a new organization formed for the advancement, growth, increased knowledge and numbers of all Large Poultry Fowl, Standard and Non-Standard. All non-standard LF must be in the final stages of acceptance into the APA Standard which means they must have a written and approved "Standard Description" of their new variety/breed. 50% of ALFA© membership fees in a district will be given back to each District for their Annual District Show

**I**t's Spring time YEPA Members! You know what that means...Chicks yay!!! I go back and forth about my favorite time of year in regard to exhibition poultry...I love the hustle and bustle and excitement of shows, but I also love the excitement of chicks and watching (and hoping) for those future champions!

Speaking of chicks...Last year I purchased six heat plates, nipple style waterers, and tried both corncob and pelleted bedding as opposed to shavings. I really do believe the heat plates are a blessing and the combo of pelleted bedding, nipple style waterers, and the heat plates resulted in a great grow out rate, cleaner brooders, and less work on us humans end for cleaning!

One thing I try to do for you guys is keep an eye out for neat ideas I hear about on Facebook and at shows. One thing I saw was an idea by Michelle Sepiol which was so much better than what we had been doing and I think would be of great help. She said she prints out a copy of her entry forms and puts them in a clear sleeve that she can write on and takes them to shows. Sounds simple right?!

I'm actually going to make a place in the trailer to hang a clipboard with the sheet, so nothing gets left behind from now on. Believe me it happens...birds get left at home, in trailers, boxes, and even at shows more than you'd think.

Another thing I personally do is bring copies of show reports to the shows and fill them out even if we don't win. The form is usually pretty simple and doesn't take much time to fill out. A d'Anvers club member of mine keeps a notebook with details from every show and wins including # in the class, what was shown, what won, and so on. I thought this was a great idea and I started keeping my own "show diary".

Lastly, in the spirit of hatching season I've been trying to figure out the best way for me to keep chicks of the same varieties, but different pens, separated at hatch so I could mark them. Marking the eggs before they hatch is easy but when you have 60 chicks hatching at once keeping them separated is impossible if they are all hatching together. Some ideas I have seen and will be testing out are using linen or onion bags, stagger hatching, making small boxes out of hardware cloth, using green strawberry baskets, and dividing the bottom of the incubator.

Do you have something that you found to be really helpful or works great you would be willing to share? We always welcome articles from members and they are great to add to your ACE books!

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## April 2019 News

Hello from the APA Office! Things have been a little slower here than I expected in February and early March, but I am sure it will pick up as the spring shows kick off. In January there were a lot of membership renewals but those have tapered off. Everyone with a 1/1/2019 expiration date was mailed a "Final Notice" postcard giving them until April 10<sup>th</sup> to renew and I hope they all will. For those with email addresses this is at least their third notice. Anyone who receives a paper copy of the newsletter is provided their membership expiration date as the first line of the address label. We don't want to remove anyone, but cannot carry folks indefinitely without the payment of their dues.

I have had a couple of questions from members who renewed through Member Planet concerning membership cards. When I assumed this position, I understood that members who renewed through Member Planet had the ability to print their own card. When I looked into this, I found out the membership card template had not been set up. That has been corrected and you can print a membership card by selecting the "My Profile" choice on the left of the screen when you log

in. One of the choices that will appear is "Member Card" when you hover with your mouse over the "My Profile" tab. Click on the "Member Card" choice and select the drop-down tab by the gear icon. "View Card" will appear and if you select that you can then download a PDF that you can print. Anyone who wants a card can also contact the office and I will be happy to drop you one in the mail.

Another membership issue that seems to cause some confusion is Junior memberships. All members under 18 years of age must sign up as Junior members. This does not mean you may only show in the Junior or Youth portion of a show. Junior members have all of the rights and privileges of all other members with the exception that they cannot vote in an APA election. They may show in open shows, accumulate points, win awards, etc. just like any other member. They may also show birds in the Junior or Youth shows as long as the same birds are not shown in the open.

The Yearbook Committee is hard at work putting together another quality product to be delivered early this summer. Advertising rates remain the same as last year and can be found on the APA's website or by contacting the office. Anyone who wishes to submit an article is also welcome to do so. A copy of the yearbook is sent to each Annual, Junior, Life, and ETL member as well as to each advertiser. I also send a

copy to each new member who joins the APA. This means your ad reaches at least 4,000 people that are somehow involved in exhibition poultry. Pretty cheap advertising when you look at that way!

# The Story Behind My Champion Paint Silkie

The Paint variety of Silkie (a white Silkie with black spots) is a fairly new color of Silkie, having been created by Judy Lee back in 2000. I started breeding Paint Silkies about 6 years ago with a 'pet quality' Naked Neck Paint cockerel gifted to me from a friend who had purchased hatching eggs from Judy Lee.

At the time I started showing Silkies, the Paint variety was not



an accepted variety, meaning that they had to show as a Non-Standard Variety and could go no higher than Best of Variety in a show. I usually won BV Paint Silkie and had a good many Champion AOV/NSV awards with my Paints, but I didn't think much of it, mainly because I didn't have much competition in Paint silkies back then (as in, I was the only one entering Paint Silkies). Still, I knew I had bred some pretty good Paint's, but my first real competition was at the Dixie Classic held in Knoxville, Tennessee. This was the year that Paint silkies were up

for consideration by the ABA to be a recognized variety - 2017. There were 63 Paint Silkies entered in what was the APA Nationals that year. And even though I placed no higher than a respectable #1 placing with a Paint hen, I was competing against some of the best bred Paints in the Nation.

After my first 'big' win with a Paint Silkie, I started breeding Paint Silkies in earnest. Judy Lee, the original breeder and creator of the first Paint Silkie had put up a "bounty" of sorts



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for the first person to win a class Champion "Feather Leg" win in a sanctioned show. Oh how I love a challenge! In the Spring of 2018, I started breeding Paint Silkies in earnest, but the majority of my babies were solid black or not very spotted. I ended up selling off my entire flock of Paints, except for just 3 birds. They were one of my original Paint hens and 2 young pullets that showed promise. One pullet in particular showed "type" at a very young age. I waited until this bird matured a bit before entering her into competition. Her first show was at 7 months of age. I entered her in the Dixie Classic / TVPC show in Knoxville, Tennessee on 12/1/2018. This was the same show where I had won best Paint Hen the year prior. Here she managed a 'Best Variety' Paint Silkie in a fairly large class, and so her show career began.

Her next show was the South Mississippi Standard in Columbia, Mississippi on 12/8/2018 where she placed

Best of Variety Paint both cards, but took a respectable Best of Breed Silkie, and was Reserve Feather Leg on the Blue card. Judge was Chris Hawes.

My pullet's third show was the Red Stick Poultry Show in Baton Rouge, Louisiana on 12/15/2018. Here she placed Best of Variety Paint on both cards and went on to win Best of Breed Silkie and Reserve Champion Feather Leg. The judge was Brian Caraker. Oh so close, but by now, several other breeders had also won a Reserve Champion 'Feather Leg' with a Paint Silkie.

Her 4th show was at the Calhoun 'Expo' Poultry show at Anniston, Alabama on 1/5/2019. Here she placed BB Silkie both cards, but also went on to win Champion Feather



Leg, Reserve Champion Bantam, and Reserve Champion of Show, Judge - Daniel Dysart.

Finally, a Paint Silkie had won the Feather leg class! In doing so, she became the very first American Paint Silkie to do so. History was made that day!

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# BATHING YOUR CHICKENS – FOR THE NOVICE

## *WHAT? BATH YOUR CHICKENS?*

It always amazes people when they find out you can bathe and groom a chicken. They laugh and say, “Why would I want to do that”? Just consider this. We bathe our horses, we bath our dogs, and we bath our cows and other animals. Why not a chicken? When you watch a dog show or a horse show on television or attend one in person, are those animals covered with dirt, mud or worse? Don’t you see the owners or the exhibitor primping, doing all they can to make that animal look it’s best and feel its best before it goes in front of the judge?

Chickens, like dogs and cats, get external parasites, such as lice and mites, mosquito bites, sometimes a tick or a chigger bite. One way to make them comfortable is to give them a nice bath. Of course, another way is to dust or spray them on a regular basis to eliminate the problem before it begins but not everyone does that either and that’s a whole other article and learning curve.

Of course, if you show your chickens or intend to show them, you want them as clean they can be to show off that fancy dress they wear year around. You should never, nev-

er, never take a dirty bird to a show, be it a chicken or a duck. Dirty birds don’t win, they are out of condition.

The next time you are at a show or a fair, take time to look at the birds. Which ones do you like the best, the birds with dirty feathers, dull combs and dirty feet or the ones that look like a picture out of a magazine? Stand back and really look at these birds. What do you see, what did the judge see? Why did he “place” one bird over the other? In some large shows, the placement can be very close and the difference between one bird being placed on Champion Row and one that is left in the cage will come down to it’s being clean and groomed if they are equally what we in the hobby call “showing well” that day.

In this article we’re going to

talk about bathing a chicken and we’re going to relate it to preparing a chicken for show since this is what most people go through when they get ready to show their birds. The photo’s we are using are compliments of our YEPA club members, Megan & Makayla Kinard.

When choosing a bird to show you need to look at two important things when you are picking your bird that you want to show. Number one is the bird meets the standard as closely as possible and it is in “condition”. Condition starts early in a bird’s life. Make sure it is fully out of a molt, there are no broken or ratty feathers. Number two, make very sure it is in excellent health without any health issues that you might spread to other birds in the showroom.

When bathing for a show, you should do it at least 3 to 5 days before the show. If you bath several days before a show this will allow plenty of time for the bird to dry completely and for it to work some of the natural oil back into the feathers. Grooming starts at bath time too. That includes trimming that over-long beak and toenails, shining up the comb, wattles, legs and feet. This is when you put them in the conditioning pen or cage, keeping them as clean as possible before you head to the show. The final, last minute touch-up/grooming takes place after your bird is in the show cage and just prior to judging. Be sure to take supplies you will need for this step.

Gather your bathing supplies and place them within easy reach. This list is simple and basic. You will need: 3 wash tubs, shampoo, white vinegar, an old toothbrush, dog nail clippers or human toenail clippers, maybe blow dryer, a small sponge or old wash cloths, several clean bath towels and a clean cage for drying. Some extras that you might want to have on hand are an emery board for making smooth the beak and nail trims, and a blood stop in case you cut a nail too short. If you don't have blood stop available cornstarch works well as a substitute.

Start with the three tubs of warm water. The tubs should be large enough to give you plenty of water and plenty of



room for a good bath. Don't try to bathe a large bird in a small plastic bucket because it just won't work! You can use laundry type tubs, large plastic buckets with rope handles, even the plastic storage tubs advertised to store blankets, etc. that you can purchase at any discount type store. Just be sure it's deep enough to hold a goodly amount of water.

Make sure the water is comfortable enough for a baby and it'll be comfortable for your chickens (warm but not hot). The first tub is used for the bath adding your choice of soap, the second tub is used for the first rinse and the third tub is used for the final rinse. In the second tub, put about  $\frac{1}{4}$  of white vinegar for every gallon of water to ensure you remove as much soap as you can from the birds feathers; in tub three you could put a very light dose of hair conditioner or a little Pyrethrum dip

to kill any lice or mites that the soap bath didn't kill being sure to follow the manufacturers instruction for dosage. (This dip is a fairly safe natural pesticide, a plant extract that's relatively non-toxic to humans and birds but it highly toxic to insects). You can get this from most poultry suppliers and sometimes in a local farm store.

Now the fun begins. Holding your bird with its breast resting in the palm of one hand and the other hand over the back securing the wings with your fingers, lower it slowly into the first tub of water, allowing a few seconds for the bird to realize what is happening. If it's the first time they will be insecure, not understanding what is going on. Be prepared for wings flapping trying to get out of the tub.

Most birds will relax after a couple minutes and some will even go to sleep during the process of the bath. This really

happens, so keep a watch on your bird so their head doesn't go under the water. If you hold him right, you can even let his head rest on the edge of the tub. Wet the bird with your hands or gently use a wet washcloth or sponge.

Once you have the bird thoroughly wet, start putting some shampoo on the dirtiest parts of the bird first. This is usually the vent area, the legs and feet. While these parts are soaking, shampoo the rest of the bird slowly and gently, being careful to go with the grain of the feathers and gently massaging the soap in towards the skin. If you go against the grain of the feather you are apt to break feathers or damage them in some other way. This just doesn't work if you are going to show that bird, believe me, the judge can find them. Take your time, be very relaxed, and do a good job.

Next, remove the bird from the first tub by holding it firmly under its breast with one hand and one hand on top covering the wings with your thumb and little finger. This will make the bird feel secure and you won't get a flapping wing shower. Let him drip off a little then place him in the second tub of vinegar rinse. Run your hand and finger all over the bird to be sure you get all of that soap out of the feathers. Following the same steps of holding the bird comfortably, move him to the third tub for his final rinse. Be sure to rinse, rinse, and rinse to get all of that soap out of the feathers.

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Make sure there is no shampoo left in the feathers because this makes them look gluey and the feathers stick together when they are dry. (Think of drying your hair with shampoo in it).

Once you are quite sure you've rinsed the bird well take him out of the tub and wrap him in a towel leaving his head out of one end and his feet the other end. Sometime if they

have lots of feathers and the first towel has soaked up lots of water you should rewrap him in a second dryer towel. The experienced exhibitor often laughs and say they wrap the up like a burrito. This will help dry the bird and keep it still so you can clean its head, legs and feet. While wrapped, you wash the face, wattles, and comb with a small cloth or sponge. Trim the

top beak so that it is even with the bottom and use the emery board to smooth the edges. After a good bath and a good face washing, it's time for a good pedicure. Using the old soft toothbrush, give the legs, feet and toenails a scrubbing. Make sure you remove any old "poo" that is under the nails as judges do notice. You may need to use a little soap to do a complete job. Rinse them well under running water. Now clip the nails. The nails are much easier to clip once they have been softened in the water and are clean. Be careful not to trim too short as they have a vein that runs down through the toe and into the toenail. Clipping this too short will cause them to bleed. This is usually not serious, but it can get blood on the feathers and certainly is uncomfortable for the bird.

It's fairly easy to see the vein on white nailed birds but on darker nails you might have to look under the nail to see the vein. If the nail is a dark nail,

clip a little bit at a time, checking after each trim. If the nail does bleed, use blood stop or corn starch or flour to control and stop the bleeding.

Now your bird is ready to be put into its clean cage or carrier to dry. While all birds can be air-dried in a warm environment (not in the sun or in front of a heater, loose feathered birds such as Cochins, Silkies, Brahmans and Orpington's might benefit from drying with a blow dryer. Birds with tight feathers such as Old English, Modern Games, Rhode Island Reds, Wyandotte's, do better drying on their own. Like you a wet bird hates drafts and can catch cold, so be sure you put them in a draft free area.

Don't forget, if you are showing those birds, taking a grooming box with you for some last minute touch ups after traveling in a confined travel box. You want them clean & picture perfect for judging.

Remember never do anything to your bird or use any-

thing on your bird that might harm it in any way. You can learn much from other breeders and you may want to try some of the other methods. As you attend more shows, you will see other breeders groom their birds and you will learn more techniques and see other products used on birds.

Now you can walk away knowing you have done your job and that your bird looks its best.




